#### From the Pulpit - Pastor Bob

You may not be surprised to learn that one of the items I received for Christmas (from Santa of course, never too old to believe) was a book by a New York Times writer I much enjoy, David Brooks. Brooks often writes on topics that include religion, moral values and how those are expressed in life. The book is entitled <u>The Road to Character</u>.

Although I have not yet finished the book, I would like to share some initial impressions with you. He starts his introduction with a concept I have heard him use in other pieces, the difference between resume virtues and eulogy virtues. The resume virtues are ones you list on your resume, the skills that you bring to the job market and that contribute to external success. The eulogy virtues are deeper. They are the virtues that get talked about at your funeral; where you brave, honest, and faithful.

He hypothesizes that most of us if asked would say eulogy virtues are more important than the resume virtues. But then he starts to build the case that this may not be where our society has moved to in recent decades. He will contrast two moral ecologies. The older is a culture and intellectual tradition that emphasized our brokenness. It was a tradition that demanded humility in the face of our own limitations. He suggests we have seen a broad shift from a culture of humility to the culture of what you might call the Big Me, from a culture that encourages people to think humbly of themselves to a culture that encouraged people to see themselves as the center of the universe.

The shift from one moral culture to another is not a crude story of decline, from noble restraint to self-indulgent decadence. He acknowledges that each moral climate is a collective response to the problems of the moment and the change has not been without both gains and losses.

One of his examples that I will share briefly is just too appropriate for this time of year. Some of us will remember in January of 1969 when two great quarterbacks faced each other in Superbowl III. Both Johnny Unitas and Joe Namath were raised in the steel towns of western Pennsylvanian. But they had grown up a decade apart and lived in different moral cultures. Unitas grew up in the old culture of self-effacement and self-defeat. Remember his white short-sleeved, button-down shirt and narrow black tie. Remember Namath with his white shoes and flowing hair, brashly guaranteeing victory. Broadway Joe to many fans. (By the way, the AFL Jets defeated the NFL Colts 16 to 7.)



If you want to read this book after I finish, let me know. Or I am sure you can get it from either the library or Amazon. I would be interested to know what you think about how this is reflected in and impacts the church and the larger society.
